Abstract:

This article presents a practical analysis of the *harmful concomitant results* which arise beyond the specific and apparently favorable result sought through the actions of the consciousness. The objective of this study is to enlarge the way we understand the effects of conscial manifestations based on the overall vision of the conscientimetric evaluations of the lucid researcher.

Resumo:

Este artigo apresenta uma análise prática sobre os *resultados concomitantes nocivos* que surgem além do resultado específico e aparentemente favorável buscado através das ações da consciência. O objetivo deste estudo é ampliar o modo de compreender os efeitos das manifestações conscienciais a partir da visão de conjunto nas avaliações conscienciométricas do pesquisador lúcido.

Resumen:

Este artículo presenta un análisis práctico sobre *los resultados concomitantes nocivos* que aparecen más allá del resultado específico, y aparentemente favorable, buscado a través de las acciones de la conciencia. El objetivo de este estudio es ampliar el modo de comprender los efectos de las manifestaciones conscienciales, a partir de la visión de conjunto en las evaluaciones conscienciométricas del investigador lúcido.

Definition. The *harmful concomitant result* is the entropic, negative, and many times non-intentional consequence or effect which is, however, simultaneously being generated by a determined action or group of actions directed at attaining a specific objective.

Synonymy: 1. Entropy of the result; prejudicial epiphenomena; collateral *pathoeffect*; harmful intercurrent result; harmful peripheral result. 2. Anti-cosmoethical simultaneous result; pathological by-

-product of an action. 3. Mishap; conscial *deficit*; excess result.

Antonymy: 1. Conscial *profit*; beneficial concomitant result. 2. Specific result. 3. Absence of result.

Euphemism. The sports event in which there is imminent risk of harmful parallel consequences is generally called a *risky sport*.

Colloquialism. There is a common expression to name the entropic effect originating from the

actions of the intraphysical consciousness: "Negative side of the result".

Synthesis. Here is a three-word megathosene which summarizes this subject: *Deleterious parallel result*.

Analogy. When anticosmoethical, the condition of harmful concomitant result is similar to the so-called *second intention*.

Hyperacuity. The extent of a harmful concomitant result reflects the level of hyperacuity of the consciousness who provokes it, starting from their mentalsomatic *non-intrudability* or *intrudability*.

Paradox. The act which is based exclusively on a good intention, and which is deprived of a greater rationality regarding the foreknowledge or lucidity about reality, tends to produce larger harmful concomitant results due to one's lack of overall vision.

Examples. Following are 31 examples, arranged in alphabetical order, which explain the approach to harmful concomitant results:

01. **After-effects.** Irreversible cerebral after-effects arising from one's violent education received during childhood (ill-treatment).

02. **Anti-hygiene.** The risk of contamination present in the act of reaching for a glass for another person by grabbing it with one's dirty hand directly on the edge where one puts their mouth for drinking.

03. **Burn.** The cutaneous burn and skin cancer caused by one's excessive exposure to the sun for the purpose of darkening the skin (*self-tanning*).

04. **Cacophony.** The cacophony in language, or the accidental forming of an *intrusive* word or expression, unsuitable in the middle of the sentence.

05. **Cancer.** The series of damages to the health of gym-goers, such as prostate cancer, derived from the use of anabolic steroids, or even to get around the condition of ectomorphy (the thin person who has difficulty with gaining *mass/weight*).

06. **Collateral.** The collateral effect, for example, which interrupts the production of personal lucid projections outside the body, provoked by the ingestion of a medicine for the purpose of treating an organic indisposition.

07. **Contamination.** The contamination during a sexual act or kiss.

08. **Deterioration.** The deterioration of one's brain through the use of narcotics or hallucinatory drugs.

09. **Drowning.** Those who deactivate the soma by drowning when they are helping another person.

10. **Drunkness.** The chronic cerebral lesions acquired by boxers, such as the so-called *punch-drunk* – memory loss, speech disorders and tremors

due to the blows to the head suffered during the rounds and sparring training, which can lead to the desoma of the boxer.

Target. The main target of the *blows* in boxing is the main *rationality* organ of Man.

11. **Effeminate.** The effeminate manner of the man who seeks to be excessively sweet to show politeness.

12. **Fireworks.** The accidents provoked by fireworks during festivities (pyromania).

13. **Genocide.** Hospital and civilians accidentally hit by bombers during war attacks.

14. **Hole.** The act of boring a hole into an underground gas line while pulling a tree root out of the sidewalk.

15. **Imbalance.** The personal, energetic, holochakral imbalance after interacting with a sickly consciousness with the expectation of assisting this consciousness.

16. **Impact.** The environmental impact provoked by the construction of a badly located building.

17. **Jealousy.** The discomfort or envy manifested by people in the face of another's above-average personal performance, which can ultimately lead to one's *heteroexclusion* from certain groups or activities.

18. **Lack of coordination.** The act whereby one's sleeve touches the food while one is cutting meat on a plate.

19. **Lesion.** The spinal column lesion caused by riding on a *risky ride* at the theme park.

20. **Materialism.** The psychophysical fixation to the Earth generated in the materialist intraphysical consciousness, excessively dedicated to the work of personal subsistence (workaholic).

21. **Obstruction.** The moment in which the hungry pet cat *asks* to be fed by rubbing itself between its owner's legs, who is, at the same time, impeded from walking to get the food.

22. **Paracomatose.** The person who experiences the paracomatose condition while sleeping, wasting sleep hours without extraphysical lucidity.

23. **Perfectionism.** The perfectionism resulting from the excessive rationality of the intraphysical consciousness, methodical regarding their *thinking life*.

24. **Poisoning.** The poisoning caused by breathing in the smoke from the incense lit right below or next one's own nostrils during meditation.

25. **Pollution.** The pollution consequent of the high level of industrialization and unbridled proliferation of the human species (demographic explosion, overpopulation).

26. **Recoil.** The *recoil* of a gun after a discharge.

27. **REL.** Repetitive effort lesions (REL) provoked by the act of typing inadequately.

28. **Retina.** The burning of the retina occurring from the extended observation of the sun to visualize some phenomenon.

28. **Secondhand smoke.** The condition of secondhand smoking caused by the act of another person smoking nearby, in a public location.

30. **Thrombosis.** The thrombosis (*economy class syndrome*) caused by blood clots in the legs of passengers during international flights.

31. **Work.** Health problems produced directly by the *object* of work, ultimately leading to one's *desoma*, as we can observe in 3 cases, listed in chronological order:

A. **Lenses.** Baruch de Spinoza (1632-1677) contracted tuberculosis (consumption) probably due to the weakening of his lungs as a result of the continuous inhalation of glass powder in his work of lens manufacturing.

B. **Radioactivity.** Marie Curie (1867-1934) probably developed leukemia due to excessive exposition to radioactive materials during her research.

C. **Paints.** Cândido Portinari (1903-1962) died due to the poisoning provoked by the high index of lead present in the paints which he used in his paintings.

Attention. Although the focus of attention determines the specific result (objective), it does not eliminate harmful or anticarmoethical concomitant results.

Unnoticed. The more focused on a specific result the consciousness' attention is, the more unnoticed the total reality of the results from their actions tends to be.

Importance. The repercussion of the harmful concomitant result can be more serious, bigger or more destructive than the implications of the specific result, which are apparently favorable, and which are generally chosen by the consciousness for convenience – just the *tip of the iceberg*.

Lesser. When employed with lucidity, the technique of the *lesser of two evils* serves to minimize the extent of harmful concomitant results through the possible consequences of a choice between distinctive alternatives.

Heterorestitution. Self-responsibility regarding *heterorestitution* (repair) is the inevitable and immediate cosmoethical consequence posterior to the anticarmoethical concomitant result produced in

the experience of interconsciential relationships.
